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Changing Attitudes and Policies

Sometimes a person will tell you something that gives you an occasion to change your behavior. For me, that person was my youngest daughter expressing the notion that her older sister with a disability didn't need me to do everything for her. The comment occurred over a dinner years ago when I had asked her to please help her sister with something at the table. At the time, I thought her response was simply an annoyed sibling conveying, I can't be bothered with this. In reality, her statement was just an honest observation. She said, "Mom, she can do that for herself and doesn't need us to do that for her". That one remark has had a notable impact on my parenting and expectations for my daughter. Why is it that as a mother of a child with a disability my natural inclination is to make life easier and "do for" my daughter instead of letting her do for herself or doing it "with her"? That simple comment (which was repeated multiple times by my youngest daughter) has caused me to pause more than once to ask myself what is best (not easiest) for my daughter with a disability. I trust that my daughter was trying to get me to acknowledge the simple truth that there is great value in doing for yourself, succeeding, and even failing. I realize that both of my daughters are strikingly competent women, but I was perhaps only conveying this message to one of them through my actions. Frankly, the best kind of love and support you can give your children is that of being seen as capable. For any of us who support those with disabilities, it is meaningful when we are able to see ability and strength and convey that message. That simple action communicated by many can contribute to the positive change needed for a more inclusive society.

Changing attitudes, and policies, is embedded in The Arc MN's Strategic Plan (2019-2024) which is consistent with the vision and mission of The Arc Minnesota. One of the highlighted strategies is the call for engagement in public policy advocacy to drive systems change so that attitudes and policies are positively changed for people with IDD and their families ----creating greater access. This change can only be achieved through the grassroots engagement and advocacy which begins with the attitudes and behaviors of family, friends and community members. Do we see persons with disabilities as capable and competent and do our actions reflect this vision? Do we see persons with disabilities as able employees and do we hire them? Do we hear their voices and allow them to speak for themselves and make their own choices? This is not about being charitable or patronizing, but about truly giving persons with disabilities the respect that any of us desire, and that is to be seen as capable and competent.

Did you miss out this year ordering roses? No worries, this is an annual spring event.


All proceeds go toward assisting people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families.

The SAM conference was held at The Doubletree Hotel in Rochester, MN on June 1, 2019 with a total of 93 people in attendance (the most ever). There were special keynote speakers, workshops, dinner, dance, bingo, door prizes, and even DETS Graduation Ceremony.

Alicia Munson, Public Policy Director at The Arc Minnesota and Katie McDermott, Advocate Associate at The Arc Minnesota were the keynote speakers for the event. They brought their magic book of spells and explained how self-advocates can make a big impact at the capitol.

Next participants broke into a variety of workshop sessions regarding: Housing Access Services; Region 10 Quality Council; How do you speak up for yourself; Your Rights related to supported decision-making and whether or not you have a guardian, and Mystery at the Ball 1 & 2, where individuals used their advocacy skills to solve a mystery.

A resource room was added to the event this year. Agencies from The Arc Minnesota Southeast Region, Region 10 Quality Council, Southeast Minnesota Center for Independent Living, People First, and of course, SAM set up booths to display their materials and answered questions.

Our conference concluded with an overview of our Disability Equality Training (DETS) that focuses on assertiveness and communication skills, the rights of individuals with disabilities, networking, and civic engagement. Twenty-four individuals who had completed the training this spring were honored with Certificates of Completion during a formal graduation ceremony.

We are finding out about quality of services and supports in our region, by completing face-to-face interviews with people with disabilities who are currently receiving support services. In addition to the 151+ interviews that we have completed in the past 20 months, we have also collected information and feedback through hosting Community Conversations; held Listening Sessions with various stakeholders; participated in local and statewide committees; attended and participated in conferences; and reviewed existing data from other sources...to name just a few of the activities that keep us informed and busy!

Region 10 Quality Assurance

Person Directed Quality Improvement Project funds were awarded in June 2019 to aid in supporting individuals with disabilities to increase their presence in community life. Seven projects were funded for a total of \$32,075. Projects funded were:

- Cardinal Club of West Concord received \$5,000 to complete the renovation of the community park in West
 Concord to make it accessible and allow people of every ability to use and enjoy the park. The impetus for making the
 park accessible came from a young Girl Scout who wanted her friends with disabilities to be able to use the park
 along with everyone else in their community.
- **ExercisAbilities** in Rochester received \$2,075 to purchase large screen iPads to support individuals with autism to improve decision making and thought processing in everyday situations.
- **Ability Building Center** in Rochester received \$5,000 to train seven staff on the Discovery Process and customized employment. The training will help the agency in their efforts to shift from center-based contracted work to more person-centered inclusive employment for individuals they support.
- Winona ORC Industries in Winona received \$5,000 for their Group for Employment Success which is a
 collaborative effort with Hiawatha Valley Mental Health Center to provide skill strengthening for employees with
 disabilities so they can be more successful in their employment.
- ArtMakers in Dundas received \$5,000 to support their programs which bring together artists with disabilities and local professional and student artists to create art together and build community. Their project funds will be used for a computer to support music and sound production, a festival mobile theater stage and costs of two productions.
- **Ironwood Springs Christian Ranch** in Stewartville received \$5,000 to support individuals with autism and their families in participating in a family camp to create positive experiences and build connections among individuals and families.
- Jeremy Westrum and his new business Growing Plants Growing Lives, in coordination with The Yellow Monkey in Rochester received \$5,000 to create a community space for individuals to learn and make items for personal use or sale including succulent planters, paintings and jewelry.

Census ... Counts!

The 2020 Census is closer than you think! Did you ever wonder why it matters if YOU are counted?

EQUAL REPRESENTATION

- Every 10 years, the results of the census are used to reapportion the House of Representatives, determining how many seats each state gets.
- After each decade's census, state officials redraw the boundaries of the congressional and state legislative districts in their states to account for population shifts.
- Completing the census is mandatory; it's a way to participate in our democracy and say, "I count!"

FAIR DISTRIBUTION OF RESOURCES

- More than 600 billion federal dollars are distributed to state and local governments each year on the basis of census data.
- At least \$1,532 per person is allocated by the federal government to Minnesota each year (that's \$15,320 per person over the next decade). If people are not counted accurately, Minnesota will lose this \$15,000 in funding (per person not counted).

DATA TO MAKE SMART DECISION

- Residents use census data to support community initiatives involving legislation, quality of life, and consumer advocacy.
- Local governments use census data for public safety and emergency preparedness.
- Businesses use census data to decide where to build factories, offices and store...which creates jobs.
- Real estate developers use census data to build new homes and revitalize old neighborhoods.
- Funding goes to school, transportation and community programs
